# According to the EDEN Constitution (Article 7.3):

"Every voting member of the Institution Section has the right to nominate candidates for election to the Executive Committee. The invitation for nominations shall be included with the announcement of the Annual General Meeting. The Executive Committee shall see that there are nominations of at least one candidate for each of the vacant seats.

No person other than an Executive Committee member retiring at the meeting shall be eligible for election to the Executive Committee at any general meeting unless not less than 3 or more than 21 days before the date set for the meeting notice in writing has been sent to the Secretariat Office. The notice must be signed by a member qualified to attend and vote at the meeting for which notice is given of the intention to propose such a person for election, and notice must also be given in writing by that person of their willingness to be elected."

#### **APPENDIX**

### ELECTION OF OFFICERS TO THE EDEN EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The procedures of nominations and elections are laid down in detail in the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and in more general terms in the Constitution of EDEN.

Unless otherwise decided by the Annual General Meeting, the Executive Committee shall have nine members representing member institutions or networks, and elected at the Annual General Meeting. Among the elected members of the Executive Committee shall be one President and one or more Vice Presidents. In addition, the elected Chair of the Network of Academics and Professionals is also a member of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be so constituted that it includes as much as possible members from the various regions of Europe and various sectors of education. The term of office is normally three years.

Every member of the Institutions Section has the right to nominate candidates by notice in writing, together with a notice in writing signed by the person nominated of her/his willingness to be elected. Such notice has to be received by the EDEN Secretariat (fax number: +36 1 463 1858, e-mail: secretariat@eden-online.org) not less than 3 days before the meeting. Notice should be accompanied by a written statement from the candidate confirming that he/she would be ready to serve, if elected, in the EC, becoming member of the Board of Directors of the European Distance and E-Learning Network Ltd. (Registered number: 2715308 England).

Candidates should have influential positions or broad contacts in national systems of distance education. They will also need institutional backing from a member institution or network.
